The Animal Rescue League of Boston (ARL) will be getting a special delivery at Logan International Airport Thursday morning – a transport of nearly a dozen puppies from All Sato Rescue, a nonprofit organization dedicated to reducing the number of abandoned dogs in the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

ARL is excited about its newly-formed partnership with All Sato, as giving these puppies a second chance at life broadens the organization's reach to help animals in need, and allows groups like All Sato Rescue to continue their important work.

"Because of the success of spay and neuter programs in the northeast, there is a real need for puppies, while other areas, including Puerto Rico and the South continue to be inundated, so ARL is excited to partner with All Sato Rescue," said Dr. Edward Schettino, ARL Vice President of Animal Welfare and Veterinary Services.
