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Emaciated Horses Rehabbing in Brewster

Horses were surrendered by owner in Plymouth County

The Animal Rescue League of Boston (ARL) is currently caring for a pair of horses at its Brewster Animal Care and Adoption Center, who were recently surrendered in Plymouth County, as their owner could no longer properly care for them. The horses are part of a recent influx of equine, as ARL's Dedham facility is sheltering five horses from a separate property in Worcester County that were also surrendered.

****On Wednesday, October 17 from 11 a.m. to noon, the horses will be made available to the media for photos, videos, and interview opportunities with ARL staff.****

The horses, ages 18 and 20, are in poor condition, scoring a 1 on the <u>Henneke Body Condition</u> <u>Scoring System</u> – meaning they are emaciated with no body fat. The animals have shown a ferocious hunger, however ARL staff is monitoring their food intake closely, as weight gain has to be done safely and slowly.

Caring for horses is not an easy undertaking. Along with copious amounts of hay and horse feed, the horses have received veterinary services including vaccinations, and hoof and teeth care from a local farrier.

Far more than an adoption center for dogs, cats and small animals, Brewster is a vital cog in ARL's capability to shelter and care for livestock. In the past year alone, Brewster has taken in a donkey, pony, piglets, as well as a number of small farm animals.

Both horses are friendly and steadily improving, and are expected to be made available for adoption in the next few weeks.
