ARL Sees an Uptick in Leptospirosis

Boston Veterinary Care Diagnoses Another Positive Case this Past Weekend

Today, the Animal Rescue League of Boston (ARL) is alerting the public about Leptospirosis – a bacteria that can infect both pets and humans, and can be life-threatening. ARL has diagnosed three positive cases of Leptospirosis, the latest coming during the holiday weekend.

The uptick in positive cases is alarming and ARL wants the public informed about what pet owners need to know – **ARL will be holding a media availability this afternoon to answer any and all questions regarding Leptospirosis.**

The Leptospirosis bacteria is spread through the urine of infected animals, and can infect humans and animals through contact with the contaminated urine, water or soil. In a city setting, it's most commonly spread through the rodent population (city parks, fountains etc..). It's easily spread to humans, and can cause kidney and liver failure.

Common symptoms include: fever, increased drinking and urination, vomiting, diarrhea, anorexia, and weakness. There is a Leptospirosis vaccine for dogs available, and ARL encourages dog owners to discuss having their animal vaccinated with their primary veterinarian.
