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## Puppy Transport Delayed by Storm Arrive at ARL

Storm currently over New England created weekend travel issues for pups

The winter storm impacting our region today was also responsible for a number of travel issues for many this past weekend in other regions of the country, including a group of 20 puppies who, after a series of travel delays, finally arrived at the Animal Rescue League of Boston's (ARL) Brewster Animal Care and Adoption Center on Monday evening, just ahead of having their second go-around with the same storm.

The puppies came from the Southern United States as part of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) <u>Animal Relocation Program</u>, and were originally scheduled to arrive at ARL on Saturday. Unfortunately, the winter storm caused the delays, leaving a brief window on Monday for the animals to travel.

The puppies, ranging from 2-to-5-months-old, have taken the delays in stride, quickly settling into their new surroundings and are ready for the next phase of their lives.

Now that the puppies have arrived, they will undergo the state-mandated 48-hour quarantine period, and then receive comprehensive veterinary exams, vaccinations, spay/neuter surgery, and should be available for adoption at ARL's Brewster, Dedham and Boston locations within the next week.
