ARL Teams with City of Boston for Low-Cost Rabies Clinic

Clinic to be held at ARL's Boston location

This Saturday, the Animal Rescue League of Boston (ARL) will host a low-cost rabies vaccine clinic in collaboration with the City of Boston.

The clinic will be held on Saturday, March 2, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at ARL's Boston Animal Care and Adoption Center, located at 10 Chandler Street in Boston South End. The clinic is first come, first serve, with no appointments necessary.

Rabies vaccines will be provided for dogs and cats, and will be \$5 for Boston residents, \$2 for Boston residents over the age of 70, and \$10 for non-residents.

The City of Boston will also provide dog licensing, which will cost \$15 for spayed/neuters dogs, \$30 for intact dogs, and no charge for seniors 70 and older.

All pets must be accompanied by a person 18 years or older, dogs must be leashed and cats must be in a carrier.
